2.	Welcome Talk by Neil	INTRODUCTION The Chair, Clare Kennedy welcomed all to the meeting along with the introduction of Neil Barton from the Basingstoke Canal Society. SPEAKER'S PRESENTATION NB gave a fascinating talk with the		
	Barton(NB)	title "The Unique Basingstoke Canal - BACK FROM THE DEAD". He first described the location of the canal, it being a remote spur of the canal network, with the purpose being agricultural rather than manufactured goods. Then he covered the canals's history from 1778 with an intial Act of Parliament authorising the canal, construction, opening in 1794,to its last commecial delivery in 1949, falling into disrepair after that. "BACK FROM THE DEAD" - Between 1973 and 1976, Surrey and Hampshire County Councils purchased the canal. Between 1976 and 1991 the canal was restored with the help of a lot of volunteers, the canal society, finally reopening in 1991. NB described the activities and biodiversity of the canal, it is a site of special scientific interest. Finally going through the challenges facing the canal, amongst other things funding and lack of water. There followed a Q&A session, questions such as dog control on the towpath, NB said there are only 6 rangers, difficult to enforce.

		A Lively and lengthy Q&A session with AP, JO, MR, DW, DL, RH		
		and JD moderated by CK followed. There are too many		
		questions to list all but some examples below:		
		Q: SK said that she was not very impressed with the police		
		response to incidents.		
		A: DL said local police split into 2 teams, a Neighbourhood Team		
		and a Response Team. The Response Team is looking for		
		patterns and does review every incident.		
		Q: David Parson (DP) asked about GP appointments, changed		
		over last 10 years, not for the better and will there be a surgery		
		in Deepcut/Mindenhurst.		
		A: DW said there will not be a new surgery in Deepcut. AP said		
		that the current system wait time is unacceptable, relayed his		
		own experience with the GP appointment system.		
		Q: How many immigrants are residing at Lakeside and are there		
		problems with immigrants absconding?		
		A: MR said he did not know on how many immigrants there are		
		in the hotel, CK said maybe AP knows. AP said that the Home		
		Office does not release the figures. DW said give him the details		
		of a any incident and he will investigate. DL said that the hotel		
		was checked once amonth, he was unaware of any problems, RH		
		agreed with DL. MR mentioned that there are families in the		
		hotel as opposed to just men.		
		Q: SK asked if the criminal records of the immigrants were		
		checked.		
		A: AP said the Home office is meant to check – there followed a		
		long discussion.		
		There followed questions on speeding signs/indicators, what sort		
		of speeding signs there should be and where. RH said he		
		preferred actual signs that give an accurate speed. DL says that		
		there is a special office that deals with their placement, give DL		
		details and he will contact them. AP added that in his experience		
		it can take years before road signage is put in place.		
		Questions on the shuttlebus to Frimley Park Hospital, it ends		
		very early and the standard bus takes forever. Suggested they		
		call Camberley Care or Helping Hands.		
		Q: Any news on new hospital;		
		A: No, information on site is due next year.		
		Q: Railway system not up to supporting all the new housing,		
		A: To do anything substantial would cost 1 billion pounds.
